Schools which planted in 2015, 2016 and 2017 are now enjoying good crops from their trees, and from the gardens around their trees.

Rawhiti School had huge crops of plums, peaches and pears. They stewed the excess peaches, pears and apples, bagged it up and froze it in preparation for delicious winter cooking.

Waitakiri School harvested sweet apricots and plums. They also had a bumper crop of potatoes which the children boiled and ate with butter.

Casebrook Intermediate School picked buckets and buckets of apples! Their pear trees have also started to produce. In the Food Room they made apple sauce which they ate with pancakes. They also made low sugar 'Casebrook Magic Muffins' with their fresh fruit.

A number of school orchards throughout Christchurch lost their plums and peaches to a late frost. The frost wove its way through Christchurch affecting some schools but not others; sadly, frozen blossoms don't fruit. Apples, which flower later, were all unaffected.

Riccarton School lost its plums and peaches in the frost but had crops of apples and a good crop of leeks in their garden.

Elmwood Normal School collected a good crop of feijoas and plums. They had low crops of pears and apples.

Fendalton School had lots of pears, some apples and blackboy peaches.

The Understorey

Plants looking after trees.

Kaiapoi North School, which has worked with the Kaiapoi Food Forest, has heavily mulched the entire orchard. As a result, they have achieved outstanding growth in the first year of the orchard and they have only watered it three times. They also have had bumper crops of tomatoes and pumpkins underneath their trees.

Burnside School has established a butterfly garden and increased native plantings which create more diversity and encourage greater health in the trees.

Knights Stream, Wharenui, Isleworth, Kaiapoi Borough and Wigram Schools all sowed lupins, mustard and oats as a understorey crop. These plants hold moisture and sustain soil health. The children were also able to collect seeds from the lupins to spread under their orchards.

Nasturtiums and marigolds grow well under trees. Nasturtiums grow rapidly and cover bare soil and hold moisture. They have red flowers and peppery leaves. Once they are sown, they will keep popping up each spring. So easy.

Marigolds which are so cheerful with their orange flowers, once planted keep self seeding year after year.
